January: Revelation

I wonder, sometimes,
Lo, that word abideth ever;
revelation is not sealed.
answering now to our endeavor,
truth and right are still revealed.
That which came to ancient sages...
written in the soul's deep pages
shines today forever new.
- Singing the Living Tradition, Hymn #189

You learn something new every day - was something I heard growing up.

It was used in a variety of ways, that made it somewhat difficult, as a child, to learn the nuances. Sometimes it seemed to be about what I was learning in algebra or geography class - sometimes it seemed to be about a new daily skill, like clearing the lint filter on the dryer; or which way to twist something to make it tight (righty, tighty!); and sometimes, maybe most often, it was about learning more about a person, or an event, or a story, that you hadn't quite put together before - and all of the sudden - something new was revealed to help make sense of it all.

The old hymn that says revelation is not sealed - truth and right are still revealed - was a radical belief in its day - and perhaps it still is.

That truth, and beauty, and hope, and what is right and what is wrong is not so simplistic, so clear, so basic that it can be written and bound and closed to be learned and memorized and finalized.

The reason we needed the teaching of *revelation not being sealed* was that often, the common, historic wisdom about right and wrong didn't match up with our lives and lived experience - with who was welcome and sacred, what was holy and should be protected, how social customs stifled our compassion as humanity.

Over and over again, century after century, people have taken old truths that still hold, and filtered out the ones that don't anymore, and busted open the binding of the closed book of truth

and found new truth, new inspiration, new revelation in poetry and art, in common labor and relationship, in movements for justice and the ability to find wonder in crayon set to paper.

There are moments in the classroom, in our homes, in our relationships there are moments in unexpected places during a Netflix binge or buried on page 8 of the newspaper where some new-found truth,
something that makes us breathe or think or feel differently than before,
when something new,
or something that just seemed hidden before that we've known deep down,
is revealed,
helping us to make just a little more sense
of this life, of this world - of ourselves.

Project Legacy's Mission: Provide hope, connections and support to youth of color ages 17-24 who are refugees, homeless, formerly gang-involved or recently incarcerated allowing them to transform their lives and become contributing members of our community. Youth are required to remain drug free and develop a positive plan for their future that includes education, career development and therapy to address past trauma.

Your contribution will go towards:

- Basic Needs (shelter, clothing, food)
- Health Costs (dentist visits, counseling, drug testing)



- College Preparation (ACT/SAT testing, campus visits, application fees)
- Post-Secondary Education (tuition scholarships, books, supplies)
- Travel Expenses (job interviews, school activities, cultural events)
