# March: Mortality

"The new home of the Universalists of Rochester was planned with a view of respecting beauty of the old Grace Church...

every brick in its walls was loved by those who had, Sunday in and Sunday out, worshipped within its portals."

- Rochester Daily Bulletin, 1916

This church, and all that happens in it, is in part a response to our mortality, this month's theme. To be mortal is to be reminded of both our frailty - of body, of mind, of spirit - and our fragility.

I remember in movies growing up seeing a big box with the words "fragile" across the top. In that context, it means something inside is delicate, precious - to be tended to with care, and intention, and the strength it takes to be gentle.

We are born into this world with the word fragile inscribed on our hearts.

And, as much as our exterior grows or changes, and our character and skills develop or shift, there is something at our core that is always fragile - to be tended to with care, with intention, with the strength it takes to be gentle.

So, too, is our church - rooted in Grace, from its early days, fragile.

And this month, as we consider its future and its health and vibrancy, and we ask you to pledge your hearts to its health and to support our important budget increases, perhaps deep down, the question is more about its fragility - and the care and intention that it has been cared with for generations.

Sure - it all costs money the paper towels and cleaning supplies, the plowing of snow and mowing of grass, the electricity, the heat, It costs a little money

for the crayons and paper, the curriculum that sparks the mind of the child, the books and poetry that invite us into deeper reflection with other people, face to face, which is a rarity these days about who we are in the world and how our soul might heal.

It costs money to keep the doors open so that hearts might be open. Because, deep down, we know that the cost is too great, if our doors are closed, or our foundation shaky - the cost is too great for us not to exist for the person who needs a blessing, a breath, a reminder that they are fragile and beautiful and this church is here to help tend to them with care, intention, and the strength it takes to be gentle.



# "Getting Better All the Time" Stewardship 2018-19 Kickoff

Fulfilling our mission: "to be a compassionate, welcoming community that nature's spiritual growth and practices justice," requires the commitment of all of us for it is what we do together that makes the difference. We are here because committed individuals 150 years ago founded a church with strong connections to each other and to Rochester. Through their perseverance we are here. Through their financial gifts, several Universalist church buildings have graced this community bringing us to our current space. Through their love and belief in a just world we are here.

And so it continues. We are here and will continue into the future because of your generosity of time,



- Kick off Sunday was March 4. On Sunday, March 11, you can return your pledge forms if picked them up at a Cottage Meeting or you can pick up your pledge envelope on Sunday return it that day or within the following week. Please contact Jim Jensen, Stewardship c if you wish to have a personal visit and one will be arranged.
- A pledge unit is either an individual or a family, a member or a friend of the church. The
  average pledge per unit is \$1,956 and pledges range from \$0 for those whose personal
  circumstances do not allow a financial commitment at this time, to \$17,000. For previous
  pledge units, your form will indicate what you have pledged over the last three church year
  On the back of your form is a suggested giving guide based on income that is a useful tool
  use when considering how support of your church family fits in with support of your own far
- To be welcoming and compassionate for a growing church with over 350 members and to rour needs, a half-time Office Assistant and additional staff hours for the Coordinator of Congregation Life will make it possible for us to make connections, be updated with what is happening, and ensure that daily church operations are effectively managed (approx. \$24,0 For our 8 staff members, we wish to give a 3% Cost of Living increase (approx. \$5,300). To nurture spiritual growth additional funds for Committees (\$12,500) will sustain the needs o current and new programs for children, youth and adults, and to fulfill our practice of justice ongoing sanctuary support.

- In your envelope is a brochure titled "Our Stewardship and Finances", which describes our annual operating budget, our special funds, and how you can support the church financially
- You will also find a letter from our Endowment committee with an opportunity to add to our
  existing endowment found through a matching grant. If you are of the age when increasing
  pledge may be difficult or impossible, we invite you to consider the church as part of your
  legacy giving.

Through **monthly Board letters**, we hope to keep congregants apprised of our decision making, setting and discernment on issues that impact congregational life. We welcome your comments concerns.
