I'll take my beginnings with my endings and I'll turn them into each other until the only things I can see are the moments I am in. - Calla Paule

I never much thought of myself as a "creative" personlike all those peers that I was certain were. It was other people who created things things made out of materials like clay or metal; things made with the color of paint or pencil or crayon; things made from some special place in their mind, their heart, that I was pretty sure I didn't have.

I much preferred paint by number than a blank canvas - what would I do with a blank canvas? How would I know where to begin?

There is something about structure that always appealed to me. Clear expectations - clear outcomes - a clear world.

And then I remember seeing a picture hanging in the office of a teacher: chaos into order:



I was pretty sure it must have been a misprint.

But over time, it has made more and more sense to me. While I have not suddenly gained skills or a desire to create what I considered "art", I have gained a sense that the world is not so clear-cut. The world, and our lives, are complicated. They are messy. They are opaque, at best - not clear.

It turns out that creativity is less about loving free time in art class, and more about finding our way, crafting our lives, creating a way, a place, right in the middle of chaos and order.

Right in the midst of order spiraling within chaos, we create beauty.

The tools of creativity are endless - compassion, care, concern, love, hope, joy -

we create beauty with crayon and paper, words and stories, coffee and bread.

Perhaps the question is not are we creative?, but rather what tools are mine, and how am I using them to create a life and a world of beauty?

Special Thanks to our Community Food Response Volunteers Ella VanLaninghman



I want to extend my very special thanks to our Community Food Response (CFR) volunteers for their incredible support and assistance over the years since I first committed our church in September 2001. I initiated it with bated breath because we are not a very large church, but you have substantiated my faith every month since then! As a cooperating church among 18+ groups that assist at least one day a month with sorting and distribution of excess food from hospitals, restaurants, businesses and grocery stores for the Community Food Response (CFR) program located in the lower level of Bethel Lutheran

Church, you have continued to volunteer every time there is a fifth Monday, Wednesday or Friday.

In 2016, CFR collected 95.7 tons of food from 34 donor sites, and provided nearly 85,000 meals, including items for the next day's breakfast or lunch. An average of 75 families (225 individuals) was served every Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Talk about a WIN, WIN, WIN situation - an ecological benefit, a service project which reaches out to the diversity in our community, and an opportunity for our voice to be heard.

Not only that ... a number of you have helped out as food pickup drivers and/or signed up to serve on the Board over the years. You are AMAZING! Many thanks to the **over 40 church families and friends** who have helped with this project over the years, in particular:
